

Secrets of the Grand Dame of Soho

Compton Street. Although it had a gay following for several decades during the 20th century, the bar came out and proud with its queer identity in 1986 and championed the modern age of homosexualist Soho. This weekend, the bar celebrates its 29th birthday as a gay venue. General Manager **Neil Hodgson** has been overseeing the shenanigans there since 1998 and knows every nook and cranny of its insides better than Katie Price's gynaecologist knows hers. In commemoration of such a landmark venue, Neil shares some of the bar's lesser know secrets...

- We have 60 years of combined service between us within the Compton's team.
- Compton's pub, previously the Swiss Hotel, takes its name from the street that's named after Bishop Compton, son of the Earl of Northampton, whose diocese this area encompassed.
- Behind Compton's are buried 100,000 plague victims.
- Current landlord of 16 years, Neil Hodgson is the great nephew of playwright Noel Coward.
- "SO HO" is a hunting call and this area was originally Henry VIII's hunting park.
- We sell II tons of beer a week and 60 litres of vodka.
- In 1942 the Landlord of the Swiss Hotel was warned by the metropolitan police not to allow sodomites or sodomy on the premises.
- The Soho Club Lounge (upstairs) bar) became a public space with the addition of the main staircase in 1996. Before that it was used as offices.
- 16 years ago we had blinds up at the windows so people could not see in and the main doors were closed during the day. Today we're proud to be one of Soho's most famous gay venues.
- We were the first gay bar to start the outside drinking culture in Soho with tables and chairs, making a statement "we are here, loud and proud!"

This week: why are we still so hung up about hanging out in saunas?

prevailing attitude amongst the younger gay generation toward the idea of gay saunas seems to be that they are patronised only by the old and lonely, those who look like Ursula's poor, unfortunate souls. Enter a sauna and it's a different story. There's a whole spectrum of flesh, both toned and not so toned, drifting in and out of the steam.

Yet you just haven't entered a sauna, you've donned a cloak within the gay scene of the Sauna User. What you've screamed upon opening that door is: 'I HAVE A PENIS AND SOMETIMES I LIKE TO USE IT'. And what a naughty so-and-so you are, you big shameless hussy *slaps wrist flirtatiously with towel in the steam room*

Hook-up apps have not hugely dented the saunas' footfall, indicating that when it comes to sex, sometimes the real physicality of the flesh is more attractive than another identikit gym-honed torso pic.

Gay bathhouses before 1969 acted not only as discreet meeting places for sex but also as primitive loci of community.

In the US they had entertainment: Bette Midler began her career singing in the gay bathhouses of New York, as Bathhouse Betty. By all accounts, she was a hoot. But generally saunas were

hidden away up back alleys and around the corner.

Because of this underground aspect, saunas become the target of other accusations that attend upon the side less spoken: disease, drugs and prostitution. It would be unwise to deny that these things do not exist in their vicinity, for human appetites often wait upon one another, but still it is not necessarily more likely focused in a bathhouse than elsewhere on the gay scene where men come together for sex.

'There was never any evidence presented that going to bathhouses was a risk-factor for contracting AIDS,' wrote the sociologist Stephen O. Murray against lobbying for the closure of saunas in the 1980s. It is true today that certainly all London and UK saunas appear to take protecting the sexual health of their clientele seriously.

Free condom and lube packs are made available, and posters warning of the dangers of HIV and other STI infections can be seen on the walls. Whether people heed this advice and use protection is, as always, their personal choice and responsibility.

Drugs such as mephedrone, G and crystal meth litter the gay scene and their widespread usage amongst gay men is a whole

other article, an article I've written many times before. But it seems that most saunas are taking active steps again to attempt eliminating their proliferation on the premises. Saunabar in

Covent Garden strongly advertises its strict anti-drugs policy.

Sweatbox Soho declares that if a client is found with G on their person its staff members are told to call the police at oncex. 'G is killing people,' says a sign on its lockers. 'Do you want your friends and family to know you died in a gay sauna? That's not sexy.' The use of 'sexy' as an adjective in this context is perhaps questionable, but the essential message is clear.

Sex drives us; it is our foremost pleasure and our hardest wiring. Sex is the reason why saunas exist, why there is cruising on Hampstead Heath and a large part of why these polymorphous dating websites and applications we are bathed in have blossomed. Whilst we harbour desire for one another these facilitators helping us to have sex will always go on to exist, although their formats may change and evolve.

So, perhaps we should embrace saunas as an integral part of our culture? When the silly soldier James Wharton claims that saunas should be shut down so that we gays can further assimilate; when the play *John* paints the steamroom as a place of lonely tragedy: both are recycling gay shame. Of course we're not all sauna users, and we're not all looking for NSA, but we can all celebrate the enjoyment and freedom of gay sex.






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Sex, Love & Equality: Issues All Generations Face

THE CIRCLE is a hybrid drama/documentary about a 1950s society of gay men in Zurich, the most openly tolerant city in Europe at the time. The film centres on school teacher Ernst Ostertag and cabaret singer Robi Rapp, who began their romance half a century ago, and were finally able to legally marry nearly 50 years later in 2003. They're played by young actors Matthias Hungerbuhler and Sven Schelker in the film's dramatic scenes, but it's the segments that centre on the real Ernst and Robi that give the film its soulful kick. Writer-director Stefan Haupt's film won both the prestigious Teddy Bear and Audience Award at last year's Berlin Film Festival.

What sparked you to tell your story on screen?

ERNST: We first thought about the making of a film during an exposition on The Circle in Berlin. That was 1999. Yet we did not know any other filmmaker but Stefan Haupt, whose brother is a friend to us. Stefan had no time, however. Later we met the two film-producers Ivan Madeo and Urs Frey, and they were interested in the story of The Circle and how we met there. Even later they told us about a film director who was also interested. It was Stefan!

ROBI: Our main concern was that The Circle should not be totally forgotten once we are dead. We now are 85, so time is running out. We also knew this story is important for younger generations.

How do you see your story's impact today? Do you think the big issues are essentially the same, or dhave things changed?

ERNST: The film gives an example of how we and other people lived, met together and how the reality of a double-life looked 50 or 60 years ago. Young men of today - and women also - very often face the same or similar problems and are forced into similar ways of going gaily and not straightly forward. The problem of coming out, of needing to explain your different form of love, is still the same and will be the same for all time.

ROBI: All of us need understanding parents who accept and love their straight or gay children equally. Gay children need more attention though, because they still face more discrimination. Their path to become an adult is more difficult.

Was it odd to see your life reenacted by actors?

ROBI: There were quite a few turbulent emotions when we watched the film the

first time. Events from 10 years of our life have been condensed into about a year, and the film screening takes just 100 minutes. This is dramatic! But people we'd never met were deeply touched, so obviously it must be a good film.

Did you help Stefan develop the film's dramatic scenes?

ERNST: We had very little to do with the "fictional" parts, but we read the script and gave hints on historical details. Then we were happy to let Stefan take over the story for the final script. However, the two actors playing us as younger men immediately got in contact with us, and we met quite a few times. We talked together, went for walks, did some housework and

shopping together and had lunch or dinner. So they were very familiar with the way we think and talk.

ERNST: On this film, both producers are gay men, while the director is not gay. Both actors playing our parts are straight, but some of the actors playing homophobic policemen are gay. All of us joined as a creative team, and we had many joyful and funny moments together.

In the film, you fall in love after what might have been a onenight stand. What's the secret to staying together?

ROBI: Good sex can lead to love and understanding and a good partnership. That means respecting the human being

and helping to develop according each person's character and wishes.

How have audiences reacted to the film?

ERNST: We have travelled to do Q&As after screenings of the film in Germany, Italy, Ukraine and America. Reactions have always been positive. Most people didn't know about The Circle, and they were fascinated to discover the existence of this international gay organisation that, since it was in Switzerland, wasn't destroyed by the Nazis. For many years it was the only gay group in Europe and the US. Audiences are also intrigued to learn that there was a time of repression in Switzerland

during the late 50s and 60s similar to the McCarthy oppression in 1950s America. ROBI: We also had a strong reaction to how our life has continued until now, which has helped people talk about their own private situations. For many, their life is similar or even worse to what's shown in the film: thrown out by parents, by the school, fired by the firm where they worked. Many younger couples told us they had to leave the town where they were born and grew up and emigrate to some far away city where they could start a totally new life. It's amazing what people have to do just to stay together. ERNST: Generally we think times have

changed, laws have changed and everything is much better and easier today. But the acceptance of being gay or lesbian has not quite arrived in the hearts and minds of a great number of people around the world. Well, not yet! So the goal of our film is to help change attitudes and put "good old traditions" through a badly needed process, asking questions like, "Are traditions a help to people of today, or have people become slaves to unhelpful traditions?" The film, however, shows a way out. People have told us that it offers a valuable example and gives them hope.

The Circle is out this week on Matchbox DVD.




Wear tracksuit bottoms instead of skinny jeans and watch London turn, change and snarl. Instead of the bored concession to generic GQ 'fashion' you were affecting, you're now license to be followed around supermarkets by security guards, lest you be pocketing Monster Munch.

Some gay fantasies fetishise the scally lad – let's sniff trainers and circle wank into a sock – but in mainstream culture to be clad in 'chav' garb is, as Owen Jones says, to be associated with the demonised working class. To many street-eyed judges, strutting out of Topman in skinny jeans, it seems that Adidas doesn't so much proclaim sporty as scream benefits.

All these strands sewn into our cultural tapestry by the power of a pair of pants? The Powers That Be have been getting drunk on judgement and that tapestry is stained with prejudice juice, babes. It's an interesting experiment to make, like going

I'm not too into fashion trends, personally. It genuinely all seems a bit superficial, with self-described River Island fashonistas affecting to shriek 'individuality' to drown the drone of 'uniform'. But I do love personal style, self-expression through clothes, and if I see a Jenkin van Zyl or a La John Joseph, or a Winnifred Wyld, strutting down the street in garments that beguile the eye I try to say with my smile: I think you're brilliant.

All too often they cast their eyes down at the chewing-gummed pavement. Fantastic figures mistake unspoken praise for a piss-take grin. Not even when I'm wearing tracksuit bottoms, but because skinny jeans and brightly coloured geometric patterns are about as subverting as I get of conventionally masculine style. And boys aren't brought up to celebrate other men in peacock feathers.


The metrosexual DILF on *The Only Way* is Essex might wear a light pink T-shirt and use moisturiser, but purple lipstick, Kerry Katona hoop earrings and a leopard-print gilet? Man, you cray-cray. Not that all men should be forced to sport the East Bloc-afterparty look, that would be like corporations forcing their staff to wear grey personality-leeching suits to work, but we really need to work through this ingrained feeling that men shouldn't be free to wear this ensemble.

Isn't it strange that, as a culture, one of the things we're most suspicious of is aesthetic declarations of others' individuality? Yes if you're 'eccentric dresser' Lady Gaga; not on my watch, mate, if you're a nobody down the local at half-five on a Friday. I am a bloke and blokes wear classic Levis and black V-necks from Primark; if I'm feeling adventurous, I'll go for a polo neck. Suave.

We pour this thinking into our children from birth and because it's wormed into our own thinking, we don't think we're

doing anything wrong. Hence why a children's television programme aired over Christmas on peak-time BBC One was not just brave, but convention-exploding. It was named *The Boy in the Dress*.

Dennis is a talented thirteen-year-old footballer, who gets whispered to by Vogue in newsagents. He's enraptured by the glamour of Kate Moss, and the beauty of dresses, and is finally helped to express himself by a fashion-conscious sass-minx at his school. But when his schoolmates discover his cross-dressing, ridicule ensues from his peers and punishment from his teachers until the narrative's cathartic climax.

Why is this brave television? Break down the gender norms and it translates to: a person wears an item of clothing. Hardly earth-shattering. As the unsurpassable David Hoyle said when I interviewed him last year for a feature on drag: 'The idea that an item of clothing can have a gender of its own is ridiculous, it's just a piece of material cut in a certain way.'

Men are from Venus, women are from Mars – or fuck me, is it the other way round? Feminist theory, from Simone de Beauvoir's Second Sex to Judith Butler's performance of gender, proclaims the naivety of ascribing generalised characteristics to people based on their genitals. Characteristics find their symbolism in dress. In the very worst cases we find the tragedy of Leelah Alcorn, the



transsexual teenage girl who committed suicide after being forced to dress as a boy by her Christian parents.

For gay men, naturally cut loose from the blokey straight bloke archetype, there appear to be two large camps (pun intended): those who rail against our supposed beta-male status and despise all aspects of femininity, or those who embrace it with gesticulating, 'girly' heart-patterned arms. And then there are the queers who twin the Levis with the gold Lamé, or team a dusting of ultramarine eyeshadow with an American military porn haircut.

'Gender has always been something that I have felt perfectly comfortable playing around with,' says Mark Delacour. 'Now I can't promise you will never find me in a dress in Soho dancing barefoot having kicked my heels off, but on the whole I would categorise my general attire as that of a man. But what does that mean?



Waistcoat, starched shirt, pin-stripe trousers and a pair of brogues, perhaps even a pocket watch?

'Well, sometimes, yes. But equally it can mean skinny chinos and a vest combined with a long floating cardigan and one of my signature scarves (whatever the weather) topped off with a pair of pink converse. For me it doesn't matter whether the store merchandising team, applying society's norms, put the cardigan in women's or in men's – if I like the cardigan, then I like the cardigan!'

But there are darker taints attendant on freedom of dress-expression; reactions may be extreme. In his excellent *Guardian* article, 'Men in makeup: lawyer by day, glamour puss by night', Seán Faye writes: 'Even in daylight, children in parks shout at you, men follow you down the street; sometimes it's just silent staring, sometimes it's demeaning questions. It is always threatening.' QX's very own James Egan suffered an aggressive, homophobic scare in Homerton last summer, which he accounts to the way he was dressed: 'boyish gay'.

Why do men – and it is, by all accounts, usually men – feel so threatened by other men in little leather shorts? Perhaps because it's a sign of the patriarchal castle crumbling; men's glitter eyeliner is a loose brick in the stonework. Yet the stonework was always built on flawed foundations. Men and women transcending our silly gender norms, both straight and gay, are painting the architects' vision for a new construction, built on an equality that will liberate all men from a damaging obsession with masculinity.

I hope to be taking part in that build, wearing my trackies or my skinny jeans or my pink corset dress from Primark, depending on how I want to express myself that day.





to smell her 'Perfume', Scarlett John Hansen giving us a,



2014 WAS THE YEAR that

the Above The Stag theatre established itself as London's most out and proud space for gay theatre. It delivered true diversity of performance, ranging from productions that delved into the more serious shades of gay identity to the lighter end of the spectrum, throwing a bright rainbow spotlight on the comedy many of us relish in life. Their latest production sits joyfully into that latter category, and presents

the perfect antidote to dull dry (and cold!) January.

The Boys Upstairs bills itself as 'Sex and the City meets Boys in the Band' but there's a hefty dose of Golden Girls in there, too, courtesy of the voracious sexual appetite of 'Southern Belle' loe Leather who comfortably delivers the sassy Blanche Devereaux-slash-Samantha Jones quips. (His outfits are certainly from the Blanche/ Samantha school of flamboyance!) The story kicks off when Joe's

character, Ashley, returns from overseas and crashes back into the lives of his besties Josh (Simon Walton) and Seth (Stanley Eldridge). What follows is a tour de force of late nights, snappy repartee and random hook-ups with hilarious consequences as they fawn over the new boy in the block Eric (Daniel Garcia) and negotiate their own failings with the sometimes excessive expectations they place on their friendships.

Noted praise should also go out to Hugh O'Donnell who plays no less than six roles during the play and not once confuses us with his costume changes, such is the confidence he delivers each very different character.

As innuendo goes, there's more loaded into this hour-and-a-half than an entire run of Carry On films, with gags jumping from knowingly crass to sharply witty. And just when you thought the play's writer was perhaps pandering to type, he delivers a clever self-referential moment when Josh's aspirations to be the founder of the next big hit gay app are branded 'stereotyped' and 'too niche'.

The Boys Upstairs had the audience in roars of laughter. If you're tired of hearing about the doom and gloom of humdrum life, get your arse onto one of the seats at the Above the Stag theatre and throw yourself into some wild gay abandon before the run ends.

Hi Dr Alex,

I had some vaccinations to go travelling <mark>for my gap year and I h</mark>ad a medical for work that showed I was not immune to Hepatitis B. I definitely had the full course of three jabs. I've been reading online and this seems to suggest that I'm just one of the people who so not respond to the vaccination. I'm single and always have safe sex but I'd still like to be protected so is there anything I can do to help? Thanks Ed

Hi Ed.

Hepatitis B is a virus that is spread when body fluids—such as semen or blood—from a person infected with the Hepatitis B virus enter the body of someone who is not infected. Hepatitis B virus is 50-100 times more infectious than HIV and is therefore easily transmitted during unsafe anal and even oral sex. It can also be spread through sharing needles, syringes, or other equipment used to inject drugs.

If you pick up Hepatitis B you may feel generally unwell with a fever, tiredness, loss of appetite, nausea, and stomach pains. Your stools may go pale and your skin or whites of your eyes turn yellowish, called jaundice. But up to 50% of people don't notice anything is wrong - they are infected 'silently'. After the acute

infection with the virus most people clear it natural from the body. But some people don't clear it and become 'carriers' of the virus. After many years if can go on to cause liver damage and even liver cancer.

Unfortunately, gay men are more likely to pick up and pass on Hepatitis B. Up to 20% of new cases of Hepatitis B are in gay men. But thankfully

you can protect yourself against Hepatitis B, and its sister virus Hepatitis A, by getting a series of three vaccines. Although the majority of people vaccinated against hepatitis B develop protective antibodies against the virus up to 15% don't respond, as in your case. So, you should see your GP or go to a sexual health clinic where they will give you a second 3-dose vaccine series. There is a 30%--50% chance of responding to the second 3-dose series.

If you don't become immune after the second series they may try extra doses, but it could be that you are a "vaccine nonresponder". If this is what happens to you then you should be even more careful to always have safer sex. If you ever know that you have become exposed to Hepatitis B then you should see a doctor as soon as possible because you can get jabs to try to prevent you picking up the virus.
