There's a proper riot grrrl vibe to the new album 'Sucker'. Very Courtney Love/Smashing Pumpkins/Veruca Salt, which is a departure from your previous album's (True Romance) sound. What made you go in that direction?

Redefining By Cliff Joannou



Queer as Folk helped change the media's perception of gay men. When it hit the screens in 1999 Parliament was debating equalising the age of consent. (Yes, it wasn't that long ago that we were treated different to straight people in that regard.) This week, sixteen years later and after huge advances in gay rights, writer RUSSELLT DAVIES returns to Channel 4 with CUCUMBER and BANANA, two new dramas that pull tight focus on the modern lives of gay men in contemporary Britain. And once more they feature razor-sharp writing, brilliantly observed characters and devilish comedy...

People still refer to Queer As Folk today as such a seminal programme. Why was the time right for you to return to gay drama?

I've been planning to write this much earlier, maybe five or six years after Queer as Folk. Then Dr Who came completely out of the blue and lasted much longer than I ever thought and became this ridiculous, mad roller-coaster that never stopped. The longer time has passed, the more time I've had to think about it, the more time for [lead character] Henry to settle into my head and invent new stuff. I'm surprised I left this material alone for so long.

There's terrific interaction between the young and the old characters in the series...

It was a natural thing to do. You're looking at a culture that's very youth based. Gay magazines, gay literature and conversations inevitably revolve around youth. I don't know why that is. Maybe because for men of my generation at least part of their youth was spent in the closet, so we look back with a certain amount of fascination and regret, and joy also, at who we were. We do look at young men and consider how different their lives are, for good and for bad. Plus, there's a whole other argument that we live in a popular culture that is quite sexually-charged and therefore

that puts beauty, prettiness, ageing at the forefront of the agenda. That's just part of the world we live in.

I agree. They aren't necessarily exclusive gay issues. Ageism is also a problem for older women...


I think they're problems of the West.
Sometimes we see these things as problems, but they're just life. You will hear gay men of my age saying we're not welcome in the clubs, there's no culture for us and we're too old to go clubbing.
But at the same time, the gay scene is the kind of place where if you saw an older guy or an older woman even in a bar or club you wouldn't think twice, because we are more accepting of diversity and going against the grain.

Absolutely. That's very true actually, good point. The inclusiveness to the gay society is about slightly escaping the straight world. That's my favourite thing, to stand there in a club on Canal Street and watch those people who have been bank clerks or teachers all week - and a lot of them are still in the closet in some shape or form - and they go out on a Friday night and take their top off and dance there until four in the morning. There's something beautiful about that, and it's not limited by age. But it's not particularly a gay thing, it's the tensions between men and boys, women and girls, and society in the West really.













You mentioned Henry before. If I'm honest, I didn't expect a middle-aged man to be such a perfectly suitable focal point of a new gay drama.

Yes, he's the engine of this entire thing. It's a great cast, and wonderful characters but it's all about Henry all the way through to the very last line of the very last episode.

The characters are written so well that you don't see them as stereotypes, they're just people finding their way through life. I thought Henry and Lance could easily be a straight couple facing the same problems of a comfortable, unexciting relationship that's trundled along for a decade and lost its passion.

Oh, absolutely, until you get to the very specific gay stuff about Henry's fear of penetration and the whole thing about erections because it's the one thing he's scared of. The series develops into discussing gay shame, gay panic. It's an area of gay life that's not spoken about, the stuff we run away from.

I love what Henry says about gay marriage to Lance in that first episode.

At the same time, he's a crafty bugger. He's wriggling out of that madly. He's very good in an argument. He's like a shrapnel bomb. Everything he says is to get out of that situation with Lance, so don't believe everything he says.

Is Henry afraid of what his real desires call out for?

Yes, he's fascinated by sex, obsessed by sex and scared by sex at the same time. Nothing particularly gay about that, I think you'll find many straight men who share that. That's why the series was named after erections. It's not a cheap joke on my part, it's literally what the drama is about. It's real, it's genuinely about the thing we don't talk about, erections and cock, apart from as a joke.

Is Henry the gay equivalent of the frustrated housewife?

Well, slightly yes. But at the same time he's very honest and does things that none of us would ever dream of doing, packing his life up. I describe him as a fire starter, everything's calm and he just starts the fire.

What are your views on monogamy in relationships? In Cucumber you write about this relationship between Lance and Henry, which has been long but very tedious for them.

My views are not spectacular in any way. It's marvellous if you want to be monogamous, but equally honest if you want an open one. I like Henry's honesty in that he doesn't sneak off and have affairs. I think Lance is much more complicated

in his definition of monogamy and open relationships. Henry talks about people he fancies who he sends texts to and might have lunch with but nothing happens, but it's like a miniature affair without anything happening. And it's very true of life, you might have people on your phone that you give two kisses to instead of one. The shades of relationships are infinite. It doesn't mean affairs. It's nothing to do with monogamy or polygamy, it's to do with existing in the world in which there's more than one person you fancy. I love my boyfriend deeply and I'm so glad we can say to each other when we fancy other people, like when we're watching television and we say, 'Oh he's gorgeous, isn't he?' I've seen couples that can't do that.

Does the concept of gay marriage appeal to you?

I think it's marvellous that it exists. I had a civil partnership with my boyfriend. I'm not particularly interested in turning that into a marriage, because it doesn't mean much to me. I think it's excellent that the battle has been won. The principle is perfect, but it's like Henry in Cucumber who never grew up with marriage as an option. It's absolutely admirable that it's been won, and it's an evolution in our society, but not one that I'll be dancing in the street for.

Tell us about Freddie Fox's character, who is depicted as this very open, and liberal person.

There are slow reveals of character with him. Freddie is bisexual to start with, he's out to his parents, he's enormously confident sexually. But perhaps too confident. In episode three there's a reveal about his past, about the first man he had sex with, how that happened. They're not big twists like a soap opera, it's the finding out of people's lives; the smaller these details are, the better. With Freddie there's a boy that's out and confident. Society would tell us that men like that don't have problems, but that's not true of anyone, everyone has problems. I want to look at someone whose life should be perfect, but isn't. He creates problems for himself, is haunted by things he should have done. He's slightly fallen off the shelf, should have been to university, he got too drunk, he's in a shit job and caught in the zero hours contract world. He's not young-young, he's not 16, he's 24, so it's that generation.

I love the idea that Henry crashes into these young guys' lives...

It's great. Imagine these two hedonists, and Freddie finds suddenly there's this fifty year old man living with them. It's enormously funny. So, it becomes the source of their friendship and it's not a simple friendship, it's one-step forward two steps back.

#Truvadawhore

Continuing our discussion on gay men's relationship to shame and sexuality, Greg Mitchell talks about his experience of being on PrEP, the controversial new HIV prevention treatement...

'm Greg Mitchell and I'm a Truvadawhore. I take one pill a day (Truvada) and that stops me getting HIV. It's called PrEP (Pre-Exposure Prophylaxis). However, some in the gay community think taking PrEP makes me a bad person: irresponsible, a slut, a whore.

I'm a product of the pre-AIDS generation. I remember a time when there was no HIV. Somehow I survived the worst of the AIDS epidemic and I'm still HIV negative. How I got here is no doubt down

to a little judgement and a lot of luck. Statistically I should be a statistic.

Back in the 80s the fear of AIDS stopped me having sex completely for quite a while. But eventually I started again. I used condoms and I hated them. Sex could still be good, but it wasn't the same.

However, with the advances in HIV treatment, I'll admit my adherence to safer sex started to falter. At first it was just what they call 'dipping': when you put it in for a few minutes, and think: 'that doesn't count'. Then there were other occasions when I wouldn't use a condom at all. There would be discussion, 'risk assessment', and I would decide to take the risk.

I was finding it harder and harder to use condoms. I'd lose my erection. I'd become so fixated on the business of getting the packet open, and the bloody thing on. I was beginning to give up the idea of penetrative sex altogether. So PrEP seemed like a miracle, and it's changed my sex life.

Because it has removed anxiety. I know I can't get HIV. I know I can't pass it on. That is a liberating feeling. Short of a vaccine, I thought it the most important advance in HIV research since the discovery of anti-retroviral treatments. My family and my straight friends agreed, so I was astonished to find that many in the gay community were less enthusiastic. Why?

Ultimately I think some of the negative reactions come down to shame. Gay sex, any gay sex, has long been about shame. It wasn't that long ago that it became decriminalised here (in fact it was still illegal when I was growing up), and in 81 countries around the world it is still

against the law. In the 1980s it became even more shameful as we discovered it was one of the transmission routes for a deadly disease.

Before that time condoms were for preventing babies. No gay man would ever consider using one, but, as our brothers started to die around us, we realised it was either put a rubber on it or become another statistic.

And that's when condom-free sex became shameful. We even coined a new word for it, a loaded word that carried with it a sense of risk. Barebacking. New treatments meant that HIV was no longer deemed a death sentence. Still, I'll wager most of the people indulging in occasional condom-free sex end up feeling guilty for ages afterwards, hoping against hope that when they next test they will be okay. But that probably starts a pattern. Once you get away with unsafe sex once, you try again and again, until one day you go for that test and it comes back positive.

I am also convinced that many of those who condemn the use of PrEP are under the misapprehension that those gay men testing positive are just the dirty gay guys,

the ones who go to weekend sex parties and take lots of drugs, and no doubt there is an undercurrent of feeling that they deserve it. Good gay guys subscribe to the hetero-norm, they meet the man of their dreams and settle down in a monogamous relationship, whilst the bad ones have multiple partners and go to cruise bars and sex clubs.

But many of these 'good gays', the ones with boyfriends, the ones who think they are in monogamous relationships, are still testing positive. In fact more than half of all new HIV cases come from the primary partner. Maybe some of these good gays are not that good after all; maybe we should stop condemning people who choose a different lifestyle from our own; maybe we should all stop being so damn judgemental. Because PrEP can eliminate the difference between negative and positive. We can become a community that is no longer split by our HIV status.

Quite the opposite of being irresponsible, PrEP is taking responsibility for my own health and the health of those with whom I have sex. If that makes me a Truvadawhore, then so be it.

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Joiners Arms has been awarded its Community Asset Value status at the eleventh hour from Tower Hamlets Council. The pub can now be potentially saved by the community, should they raise enough money to purchase the venue. Below is what community activist group 'Friends of The Joiners' had to say about the matter.

From the 'Friends of The Joiners' Press Release:

n Thursday 15 January 2015, Friends of the Joiners Arms the campaign group seeking to save and evolve the LGBTQIA pub The Joiners Arms on Hackney Road, London received confirmation from Tower Hamlets Council that their application for Asset of Community Value (ACV) status had been approved. Crucially, now that this status has been secured, Friends of the Joiners Arms have the right to bid on the property if it goes up for sale and the status may impact decisions around future planning applications for the building.

The LGBTQIA community of London and its allies have huge ambitions for The Joiners Arms. Campaigners have been meeting regularly to refine ideas for what can be achieved in this invaluable space, and connections have been made to likeminded groups, organisations and campaigns to construct what an LGBTQIA Community Centre could do to best serve the local community. Friends of the Joiners are committed to a centre which is cooperatively and democratically run, expanding its services and activities and becoming a hub to fight for minority rights and against poverty and gentrification.

As far as campaigners understand, The Joiners is currently en route to demolition, with plans to develop the land into another highend, soulless apartment block - likely to be out of financial reach to many local residents. It filled punters and locals with sadness that on Sunday 11th January 2015 The Joiners Arms closed its doors to the public for the last time, and on 15th January 2015, The Joiners' management vacated the property for good.

Friends of the Joiners will do everything in their power to prevent The Joiners Arms from becoming yet another victim of rapid, heart-breaking and ruthless gentrification of London, particularly

in the East End. As the campaign to save and evolve The Joiners is at a crucial junctures. Friends of the Joiners encourages more people to sign their petition, follow them on Twitter (@joinersliveson) and to email thejoinersliveson@gmail.com to get involved with the campaign.

But although there was a ray of sunshine's optimism in Hackney, the weighing scales were balanced out by a stormcloud gathering in Camden. In a piece for Not Television, roving cabaret reporter and all-round protector of the gay scene Ben Walters writes that:

'Camden Council has announced its intention to approve planning permission to turn the first, second and third floor of the building into three flats, resulting in the loss of the first-floor Shufflewick Bar and a reduction in the ground-floor area of eight square metres.'

As we were going to press news came in that The Yard in Soho was also battling the encroaching hand of the property developers. We will bring you news of this as it develops.

You win some, you might lose some, but you always gotta fight the battle.


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Band of Scold!

She's back with a one off 'extravaganza' at the Royal Vauxhall Tavern, with a live band and everything! Dead fancy! We sent Jason Reid off for a

chat with her ladyship this week...

Tell us a bit about this upcoming Live and In Concert' show of yours, Myra. What should the punters expect?

It's no less than an extravaganza, Jason! Very basically, it's me and a band, but here's the story. Last August I played Camden's Roundhouse and I did one song with a full band for a variety night. It was exhilarating! Don't get me wrong, I understand the appeal of backing tracks. They're cheap, they don't answer back and they don't have a union. But you just can't get the same energy as you can with five artists live on stage.

Safe to say you're a big fan of keeping it live then?

Well, I've always done 'live' work, with my long-term collaborator Sarah Bodalbhai, who some of your readers will recognise as the Musical Director of the RVT Panto. She's played piano for me for seven years now, and I want to take the work we've done to the next level. We're throwing everything at this show. I'm having costumes made, I've had a logo designed and I've even, wait for it, REHEARSED!

And your band, The Spiders in Bras, who are they comprised of?

Well, there's the above mentioned Sarah on the keys, who read music classically at Cambridge but loves rock & roll and pop. On drums we have Dan Paton, who used to drum with quite a famous band! But before they were famous so I don't know if I'm allowed to tell people. There's Heidi Heelz who is all about the bass (I've no idea where she stands on 'treble'), who is also in a glam all-girl rock outfit called 'The Priscillas'. Finally, on saxophone we have 'Thomas' who is more of a fan than a colleague and only ended up in the band because he won a competition and that's all I shall say about him.

Curious name. What's the story behind that?



YEARS & YEARS

'Years and Years' have been named Number One Best New Band In The World Times Five by Radio I, or something to that effect. Listen to their spectacular cover of Haim's 'Don't Save Me' in the Live Lounge and it's seemingly apparent why: a gorgeous song is re-rendered gorgeous again by the band's stripped-back percussive pop, and frontman Olly Alexander's starlit vocals.

Whispering voices have murmured that Alexander is allegedly a MASSIVE RAVING GAY but given that most of the promo videos feature him staring lustfully at girls, QX wouldn't want to waylay into this debate, lest the sweating PR team have a collective cardiac arrest.

But music-wise, do the band's original songs give solid pillars to their heaven-based hype? In two words: not always. As ever, these words are only one reviewer's opinions and I merely write my subjective reactions to music. Yet to my ear, the sound of new single 'King' verges on crass Europop, with synths-done-a-milliontimes-before and a fairly bored, generic chorus. 'Desire' follows much the same Boots-own brand Night Nurse formula.

'Real' is the first track where the aural lace gets a bit spikier and more intriguing around the edges. Twinned with a video where Alexander appears to



be torn between a boy and a girl on the dancefloor of a club - oh, the shock - the music is a darkly opalescent collation of moods. 'Take Shelter' has a similarly experimental bent to its beats, like pistons infused with tribal dance, topped off with a tropical cocktail umbrella.

Ultra-chic Parisian label Kitsuné rarely makes mistakes with its artists though. Delve deeper into Y&Y's YouTube box, and there are flashing ultra-violet gems of true, pure talent to be found and coveted. 'Eyes Shut' repaints the ballad for the Millennials, like dragging a Caravaggio into the age of graphic design.

Here Alexander's voice conveys an emotive beauty without straying into saccharine; 'throw your heart to me / let it fall and hit the ground / let it go... All I really want / Is you to understand that I'm a mess / I know you'd like me to go wrong / You'd like me gone.' 'Memo' creates a genre of its own, a blissful blend of electro-soul swinging round the honeysuckle garden with ethereal punk, and the first ever single 'Traps' proves why Kitsuné's hardon rose raging for these boys.

I fear the more mediocre offerings of Years and Years may be the damage inflicted by long-clawed, snaggle-toothed commercial witches meddling for money, but at the bands heart lies true worth.



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
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


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Health Watch

Hi Dr Alex

I've started to come out but am finding it hard work and difficult. I'm 21 and black and know that some of my family are going to have a major problem when, or if, I tell them. In fact I'm finding out first hand that some of the black community are just never going to accept me. I've met a few guys online and been to a few bars and clubs and have had both good and bad experiences. I'm learning fast but I just wonder if it is going to get any easier. Any advice?

Being black and gay puts you in not one but two minority groups, so you are likely to face challenges. Gay black men can often feel like they don't fit in either the mainstream (predominantly straight) black community or in the mainstream (predominantly white) gay community. It seems to be true that the fear of rejection, hatred, or violence can lead young gay black men to hide their sexual identity. This can lead to a lack of visibility, and when gay black men aren't visible in the community they have even less reason to expect community acceptance. Religion is often very important in predominantly black communities and, unfortunately, these churches often have a hostile relationship with the gay community. This can often be the origin of the discrimination you face.

Some black gay men feel especially stigmatised (both in and outside the gay community) by amplified versions of the stigma that, it has to be said, also face white gay men. On the one side, gay black men are portrayed as hypersexual and aggressive. On the other side, gay black men are portrayed as extremely effeminate, flamboyant, and "sassy". Dealing with peoples' prejudice about how they expect you to behave can be hard work.

It sounds as though you are taking things slowly and I think this is a good approach. You should come out at your own pace and only when you feel ready. For some support and advice about coming out I suggest you look to the voluntary organisations such as Stonewall: www.stonewall.org.uk/at home/coming out/

And on a possible weird upside there is research, albeit controversial, showing that being both black and gay can be an advantage to being 'just' black or being gay, but white. A sociologist sent four resumes from fictional college graduates to hundreds of potential employers with names that were stereotypical of black applicants and white applicants.

Some of the resumes mentioned participation in a Gay Student Advisory Council. It was found that the resume that was designed to imply the job applicant was both black and gay made him more likely to be considered for the same starting salary by employers as a heterosexual white male. Resumes that were designed to suggest the applicant was white and gay or black and heterosexual were considered for lower starting salaries! The sociologist suggested that the results showed that the negative stereotypes about gay men as effeminate cancelled out the negative criminal stereotypes about black men. Bizarre but true.

Take your time with your coming out, and don't be afraid to seek help from the numerous gay organisations out there.





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
